

RECOGNITION AND PROTECTION OF RIGHTS OF ROHINGYA MUSLIMS

UNHCR is the organ which tries to provide basic solutions such as rehabilitation, re-establishment and redress to the refugees especially the IDP (Internationally Displaced Persons) using various aids from the member nations as well as collaborating agencies.

The present committee has based its attentions of the problem of Rohingya Muslim's stateless identity in Myanmar. The Myanmar Government has not ratified the 1951 Refugee Convention and its 1967 protocol.

The present finds the Rohingya Muslims in inhuman conditions, differential treatments, unreasonable restrictions on natural rights as marriage, birth and shelter and puts them in a situation of vulnerability which calls for international attention. The said issues would be driving the committee's agenda for the two days.







UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES

The crisis faced by the Rohingya Muslims who have been ousted from their home country of Myanmar and are now living as refugees was set as the agenda of the assembly.

The committee found many delegates such as that of Thailand, Finland, Egypt, South Africa and Bangladesh vehemently criticized the degraded situation of Rohingya Refugees and advocated for restoration of their rights and status in Myanmar, while the latter opposed Rohingya Muslim's connection with the nation and characterized the same as Chittagonian Bengali, belonging to Bangladesh.

The motions in the committee touched various aspects of the agenda such as women's rights of the secluded community and their political and social entitlements. The committee coursed with a sense of belonging to one community's problem as a problem of humanity at a global level.

The agenda of the committee tackles every possible form of atrocities against female gender, including Intimate Partner Violence, Sexual Violence, Human Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation, Female Genital Mutation, Female foeticide, Honour Killing and puts a thrust on Harmful traditional practices against woman and girls in the veil of religion and Religious Antiquated Practices.

The committee aims at finding solutions within and beyond the framework of Education, Awareness, Prevention, Punishment and Solidarity.

The day began with an extremely cheerful executive board, a hot sun, a dysfunctional microphone but many anxious and smiling faces. It soon caught pace as the session ascended with motions related to Violence on women with special focus on economy and Different solutions to gender based atrocities around the globe.

While most of the delegates criticised Saudi Arabia over Sharia Laws and their gender discriminatory policies, the nation was shown empathy by delegates of UK and Brazil.

Questions were raised upon the notions of women being considered a weaker, lack of safety and health security of pregnant women, and religious antiquated practices being stereotypically biased towards female gender along with unanimous anger towards matters of virginity tests, menstruation taboos and human trafficking, genital mutation and female foeticide.

The coming of beautiful, logical and applicable solutions from numerous countries for the same set of problems and the addressing of refugee status and LGBT and transgender communities of various countries, brought together not only minds full of optimism but countries of almost no mutual relations.







LOK SABHA

TO DISCUSS THE STATE OF SECULARISM IN INDIAN POLITICS WITH SPECIAL EMPHASIS ON RELIGIOUS EXTREMISM

Secularism is a normative doctrine which seeks to realise a secular society. It is free from inter-religious and intra religious domination.

In the post Independent scenario the social dynamics was very complex. A new disturbing trend has been witnessed in recent years where villages are no longer tranquil as urban-rural interactions have become much more intense and possibility of villages becoming a site of ethnic riots cannot be ignored.

There is a new, muscular nationalism, which derives its strength from invented mythology; and has taken over the polity. Indian secularism, once thought to be non-negotiable, is beginning to look shaky now.

Secularism in the Indian context should imply respect for pluralism and a non-coercive and a voluntary recourse to change.

The present agenda of the Indian Committee seeks to find an intelligent ground of debate and decision on the same.

However, it was pointed out over and over that the members were losing track of their agenda replacing amendments with allegations, adjustments with accusations, changes with charges.

The things never went haywire, and eventually there were several concrete points in the casket of discussions upon the negative effects of religious extremism, a practice that could lead to a fall in the GDP, historical fabrication and social degradation.

Suggestions were also made to stop communal riots, mentioning the need of cooperation during times of mass agitation while never leaving the stinging string of politics.

The discussion did result in framing of several fruitful solutions, inducing hopes that Indian Politics might be in a complex nexus of confusion yet is not lost completely.
