# Change of Interval

Suppose we want to represent the function  $f(x)$  defined in the closed interval  $[-c, c]$  by a Fourier Series,  $c$  being any positive real. We consider this integral as a result of elongating in the interval  $[-\pi, \pi]$ . The interval  $[-\pi, \pi]$  can be obtained from interval  $[-c, c]$  by transformation. The interval  $-c < x < c$  is transformed into the interval  $-\pi < z < \pi$  by the transformation  $z = \frac{\pi x}{c}$ .

Then  $f(z) = f\left(\frac{\pi x}{c}\right)$  say

Let  $f(z) = \frac{a_0}{2} + \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (a_n \cos nz + b_n \sin nz)$  where

$$a_0 = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\pi}^{\pi} f(z) dz \dots \dots \dots$$

$$a_n = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\pi}^{\pi} f(z) \cos nz dz \dots \dots \dots; n = 1, 2, \dots \text{ and}$$

$$b_n = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\pi}^{\pi} f(z) \sin nz dz \dots \dots \dots; n = 1, 2, 3 \dots \dots \dots$$

Applying the transformation  $z = \frac{\pi x}{c}$  so that  $dz = \frac{\pi dx}{c}$ , we get

$$f(x) = \frac{a_0}{2} + \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (a_n \cos \frac{n\pi x}{c} + b_n \sin \frac{n\pi x}{c}) \dots \dots (1) \text{ where}$$

$$a_0 = \frac{1}{c} \int_{-c}^c f(x) dx \dots (2)$$

$$a_n = \frac{1}{c} \int_{-c}^c f(x) \cos \frac{n\pi x}{c} dx \dots (3); n = 1, 2, \dots \text{ and}$$

$$b_n = \frac{1}{c} \int_{-c}^c f(x) \sin \frac{n\pi x}{c} dx \dots (4); n = 1, 2, 3 \dots$$

If the function  $f(x)$  is defined in the interval  $0 < x < 2c$  then (2), (3) and (4) changes to

$$a_0 = \frac{1}{c} \int_0^{2c} f(x) dx \dots$$

$$a_n = \frac{1}{c} \int_0^{2c} f(x) \cos \frac{n\pi x}{c} dx \dots; n = 1, 2, \dots \text{ and}$$

$$b_n = \frac{1}{c} \int_0^{2c} f(x) \sin \frac{n\pi x}{c} dx \dots; n = 1, 2, 3 \dots$$

**Example:** Find the Fourier series to represent  $f(x) = x - x^2$  from  $x = -1$  to  $x = 1$ .

**Solution :** Here  $c = 1$ , therefore the fourier series is

$$x - x^2 = \frac{a_0}{2} + \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \left( a_n \cos \frac{n\pi x}{c} + b_n \sin \frac{n\pi x}{c} \right)$$

where  $a_0 = \frac{1}{c} \int_{-c}^c f(x) dx$

$$a_0 = \frac{1}{1} \int_{-1}^1 (x - x^2) dx = \left[ \frac{x^2}{2} - \frac{x^3}{3} \right]_{-1}^1 = -\frac{2}{3}$$

$$a_n = \frac{1}{c} \int_{-c}^c f(x) \cos \frac{n\pi x}{c} dx$$

$$a_n = \frac{1}{1} \int_{-1}^1 (x - x^2) \cos n\pi x dx = \int_{-1}^1 x^2 \cos n\pi x dx \quad \{ \text{as } \int_{-1}^1 x \cos n\pi x dx = 0; \text{ being odd} \}$$

$$= -2 \left[ \frac{x^2}{n\pi} \sin n\pi x + \frac{2x}{n^2\pi^2} \cos n\pi x - \frac{2}{n^3\pi^3} \sin n\pi x \right]_0^1 = -2 \left[ \frac{2}{n^2\pi^2} \cos n\pi \right] = -\frac{4}{n^2\pi^2} (-1)^n$$

$$b_n = \frac{1}{1} \int_{-1}^1 (x - x^2) \sin n\pi x dx = \int_{-1}^1 x \sin n\pi x dx \quad \{ \text{as } \int_{-1}^1 x^2 \sin n\pi x dx = 0; \text{ being odd} \}$$

$$= 2 \left[ \frac{-x}{n\pi} \cos n\pi x + \frac{1}{n^2\pi^2} \sin n\pi x \right]_0^1 = -2 \left[ \frac{\cos n\pi}{n\pi} \right] = -\frac{2}{n\pi} (-1)^n$$

Hence the required fourier series is

$$x - x^2 = -\frac{1}{3} + \frac{4}{\pi^2} \left[ \frac{\cos \pi x}{1^2} - \frac{\cos 2\pi x}{2^2} + \frac{\cos 3\pi x}{3^2} + \dots \right] + \frac{2}{\pi} \left[ \frac{\sin \pi x}{1} - \frac{\sin 2\pi x}{2} + \frac{\sin 3\pi x}{3} + \dots \right]$$

**Example :** In the range  $(0, 2l)$ ,  $f(x)$  is defined as  $f(x) = \begin{cases} 0, & 0 \leq x \leq l \\ a, & l \leq x \leq 2l \end{cases}$ . Expand  $f(x)$  in fourier series.

**Solution :** Here  $2c = 2l$  and  $c = l$

Therefore , the fourier series is

$$f(x) = \frac{a_0}{2} + \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \left( a_n \cos \frac{n\pi x}{l} + b_n \sin \frac{n\pi x}{l} \right), \quad 0 < x < 2l$$

Where

$$a_0 = \frac{1}{l} \int_0^{2l} f(x) dx$$

$$\frac{1}{l} \left[ \int_0^l 0 dx + \int_l^{2l} a dx \right] = \frac{a}{l} [x]_l^{2l} = a$$

$$a_n = \frac{1}{l} \int_0^{2l} f(x) \cos \frac{n\pi x}{l} dx$$

$$\frac{1}{l} \left[ \int_0^l 0 \cos \frac{n\pi x}{l} dx + \int_l^{2l} a \cos \frac{n\pi x}{l} dx \right] = \frac{a}{l} \frac{1}{n\pi} \left[ \frac{\sin n\pi x}{l} \right]_l^{2l} = 0$$



$$b_n = \frac{1}{l} \int_0^{2l} f(x) \sin \frac{n\pi x}{l} dx$$

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{1}{l} \left[ \int_0^l 0 \sin \frac{n\pi x}{l} dx + \int_l^{2l} a \sin \frac{n\pi x}{l} dx \right] &= \frac{a}{l} \frac{l}{n\pi} \left[ \frac{-\cos n\pi x}{l} \right]_l^{2l} = \frac{a}{n\pi} [-\cos 2n\pi + \cos n\pi] \\ &= \frac{a}{n\pi} [-1 + (-1)^n] \end{aligned}$$

Therefore Fourier series is

$$f(x) = \frac{a}{2} + \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} b_n \sin \frac{n\pi x}{l} = \frac{a}{2} + \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{a}{n\pi} [-1 + (-1)^n] \sin \frac{n\pi x}{l}$$

$$f(x) = \frac{a}{2} + \frac{a}{\pi} \left[ \frac{-2}{1} \sin \frac{\pi x}{l} - \frac{2}{3} \sin \frac{3\pi x}{l} - \frac{2}{5} \sin \frac{5\pi x}{l} - \dots \dots \dots \right]$$
